Core Objectives

- Establish orchestra metaphor for organizational coordination
- Shift from departmental silos to system-wide thinking
- Introduce four-movement organizational framework
- Secure specific next steps with owners and timelines

Purpose of Presentation

As you pull together the meeting, keep in mind the "next steps". Executives often need clarity like; "What decision is being made today vs later?"

The **Executive Decision Context** should be presented as;

This session is designed to:

- Establish shared understanding
- Secure sponsorship to explore orchestration
- Authorize a bounded next step (mapping or pilot)

This session is NOT designed to:

- Approve reorganization
- Commit to tooling changes
- Replace existing methodologies

Essential Customization (Complete BEFORE Presenting)

Why This Matters: Generic presentations fail with executives. They need to see their organization, their challenges, their terminology. The orchestra metaphor works because it makes abstract coordination concrete - but only if mapped to their reality.

Must-Do Adaptations

Replace Generic Examples

- Map your actual departments to orchestra sections (Sales→1st Movement, Engineering→2nd, etc.)
- Prepare 2-3 real coordination problems from your organization
- Identify existing methodology usage (Agile teams, DevOps practices, Lean initiatives)

Adjust Metaphor Intensity

- Conservative culture: Use "coordination" more than "orchestration"
- Tech-friendly culture: Emphasize methodology integration over musical metaphors
- Traditional culture: Focus on business outcomes, minimize musical terminology

Gather Proof Points

- Project delays caused by handoff issues
- Duplicate work across departments
- Current transformation initiative challenges
- Metrics showing coordination costs (if available)

Connect to Current Initiatives

- Reference existing Agile/DevOps/Lean implementations
 - Link to current strategic initiatives or digital transformation efforts
 - Build on leadership's known organizational frustrations
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Slide Overview & Key Messages

Note: Each slide has detailed presenter notes. Use this as your strategic overview, not a script.

Slides 1-2: Foundation (4 minutes)

Purpose: Establish analogy and create urgency around coordination

- **Slide 1:** Title + opening impact statement
- **Slide 2:** Orchestra analogy setup - chaos vs. harmony comparison
- **Critical moment:** Get executives to recognize their organization's "chaos"

Slide 3: System Thinking (3-4 minutes)

Purpose: Challenge current leadership behavior - the behavior change slide

- **Focus:** Conductor must see whole orchestra, not individual musicians
- **Interactive element:** Ask which local optimization patterns they recognize
- **Watch for:** Defensive responses about current leadership approach

Slides 4-6: Framework Introduction (3 minutes)

Purpose: Present organizational structure without overwhelming detail

- **Slide 4:** Four movements overview (keep high-level)
- **Slide 5:** Work center definition (ensure understanding before proceeding)
- **Slide 6:** Model as "score" for coordination

Slides 7-11: Four Movements (6-7 minutes)

Purpose: Walk through workflow structure efficiently

- **Pacing:** 60-90 seconds per movement maximum
- **Focus:** How movements connect, not individual movement details
- **Key insight:** Each movement serves the whole, not competing priorities

Slide 12: Methodology Integration (2-3 minutes)

Purpose: Address "we already do Agile/DevOps" concern proactively

- **Message:** Project Symphony conducts existing tools, doesn't replace them
 - **Analogy:** "Wouldn't use saxophone in string quartet" (appropriateness)
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Critical Delivery Points

Opening (Slides 1-2)

Energy management: Start strong with vivid chaos imagery, then contrast with harmony

Personalization: "This probably sounds familiar..." - make it about their experience **Visual**

focus: Use workflow diagrams showing current vs. future state if available

System Thinking (Slide 3)

Diplomatic but direct: Address leadership behavior without blame **Interactive:** "Which patterns do you recognize?" - get engagement early **Key insight:** "Conductor leaving podium to play violin" - this lands with executives

Four Movements (Slides 7-11)

Flow over detail: Emphasize connection between movements **Avoid:** Getting stuck in individual movement definitions **Interactive:** "Which movement has your biggest coordination challenges?"

Closing (Slide 12 + wrap-up)

Action orientation: End with specific next steps, not abstract concepts **Commitment seeking:** "What would you like to start with?"

Metaphor Management Throughout

If metaphor resonates: Lean into musical terminology, use conductor gestures **If resistance detected:** Shift to "coordination" language, focus on business outcomes **Universal:** Always return to concrete organizational examples when concepts get abstract

Common Executive Responses & Quick Answers

"We already use Agile/DevOps" → "Great! Project Symphony conducts those tools more effectively, doesn't replace them."

"Sounds like reorganization" → "Actually the opposite - we coordinate existing structure and processes."

"How long does this take?" → "If we're committed to putting in the effort, mapping out your organizational musical score shouldn't take long to begin. Most leadership teams can start seeing their workflow patterns within 2-3 weeks and have a solid coordination plan within 6-8 weeks. There is a book and field guide which provides the resources to help you create your own timeline based on your priorities and capacity." (*Adjust timeframe based on your comfort level and organizational context*)

"What resources are needed?" → "Mainly time commitment from leadership and key representatives."

"How do we measure success?" → "Four-movement progress milestones, plus flow efficiency across the system vs. just departmental metrics."

Why This Approach Works

Makes Abstract Concrete: Orchestra metaphor transforms complex coordination into relatable concepts **Builds on Existing Knowledge:** Uses familiar methodologies rather than introducing new ones **Provides Clear Framework:** Four movements give executives a mental model for organizational flow **Focuses on Evolution:** Presents as coordination improvement, not wholesale change

Success Indicators & Next Steps

Watch For (Positive Signals)

- **Metaphor adoption:** Using orchestra terminology in follow-up discussion
- **System questions:** Asking about cross-functional coordination vs. departmental performance
- **Engagement:** Active discussion about their specific coordination challenges
- **Commitment language:** "When could we start?" vs. "We'll think about it"

Immediate Actions to Propose

1. **Work center mapping session** (90-120 minutes with leadership team)
2. **Workflow analysis** using Orchestration Toolkit
3. **Pilot identification** (3-5 high-impact work centers)
4. **Follow-up timeline** (specific dates, not "soon")

- **Executive summary:** One-page four movements overview

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Final Reminders

Before You Present

- **Test your examples:** Ensure organization-specific references are accurate
- **Check metaphor comfort:** Be prepared to dial back musical terminology if needed
- **Plan interaction:** Know which executives to engage with questions
- **Prepare visuals:** Simple org chart mapped to orchestra sections, current state workflow if available
- Remem

During Presentation

- **Watch the room:** Engagement signals vs. confusion or resistance
- **Capture input:** Note specific challenges mentioned for follow-up
- **Stay on time:** 22-25 minutes total - this isn't a training session
- **Interactive moments:** Ask for specific examples from their organization
- **Confirm understanding:** "Does this resonate?" after key concepts

After Presentation

- **Remember the purpose of the presentation:** Explain what decision is being made today vs later (see above).
- **Executive Sponsor:** This work requires a named executive sponsor, alignment without ownership will stall.
- **Follow up within 24 hours:** Send materials and schedule next steps
- **Individual conversations:** Meet with most engaged executives separately
- **Begin work center analysis:** Start implementing while momentum is high

Remember: This is your opening movement. Goal is inspiration + commitment, not comprehensive education. Focus on coordination over reorganization, evolution over revolution.
